SANTA CRUZ NEWS: Police are asking for the public's help identifying a motorcyclist who struck and injured a boy who was walking with his mother in a Santa Cruz crosswalk earlier this month. Police officials said cars along Mission Street and Van Ness Avenue stopped to allow the mother and her child to cross the street on April 9. The motorcyclist, who was splitting lanes, allegedly hit the boy and fled the area at a high rate of speed. The child was taken to a Bay Area Trauma unit for treatment of injuries that are not life threatening, according to police. NATIONAL NEWS: Sheila Abdus-Salaam, the first African American woman to serve on New York's top court and the first female Muslim judge in the United States, was found dead in the Hudson River on Wednesday, police said. She was 65. The body of Abdus-Salaam, a native of Washington, D.C., was found fully clothed in the river in Upper Manhattan at 1:45 p.m., a day after her husband had reported her missing, according to the New York Police Department. There were no signs of trauma or injury on the body, and the cause of death is still under investigation. Some have assumed it may be suicide, but there is a lot of backlash from the community that are asserting it is a murder and needs to be taken more seriously. It is not yet known how Abdus-Salaam, who lived in Harlem, ended up in the river, or how long her body had been there. Her death shook the New York legal community, prompting responses from colleagues, judges, and state and local political leaders.

MORE NATIONAL NEWS: The U.S. military dropped the largest non-nuclear bomb in its arsenal Thursday on an Islamic State tunnel complex in eastern Afghanistan, the Pentagon said. A U.S. plane dropped a GBU-43—a massive ordnance air blast, better known as the "mother of all bombs" or MOAB—to aid U.S. and Afghan forces clearing the area. The bomb is a precision-guided "smart bomb" designed to cause maximum damage to bunkers, tunnels and other areas that can typically withstand even large standard bombs or artillery strikes. "This is the right munition to reduce these obstacles and maintain the momentum of our offensive against ISIS," said Gen. John Nicholson, the top U.S. commander in Afghanistan. White House press secretary Sean Spicer said the bombing took around 7 p.m. local time in Afghanistan. "We targeted a system of tunnels and caves that ISIS fighters used to move around freely," Mr. Spicer said.

BIZARRE NEWS: McDonald's launches Snapchat job applications. The fast-food giant has teamed up with Snapchat to launch a McDonald's-themed filter for the photo messaging app, with jobseekers invited to try on the uniform and send a 10-second video application. Launching on April 7th, the "Snaplications" campaign is being billed as a first for both companies. Once the application is reviewed, McDonald's will send users back to the digital careers hub where they can download an application form. McDonald's employs about 106,000 Australians, with 65 per cent under the age of 18. In Australia, Snapchat has more than four million daily users, 82 per cent of whom are young people. "I've learnt a lot about Snapchat recently from my 14-year-old daughter," said Shaun Ruming, chief operating officer of McDonald's Australia. "We think this is actually a world first. Snaplications is basically a Snapchat lens' that gives users the ability to apply for a job — or at least commence that process — by sending a 10-second snap. "We're the largest employer of youth in the country, so we're trying to look for new and innovative ways to recruit crew people." Mr Ruming said while the 10-second video wouldn't replace the traditional hiring process, it would form part of the application. "It certainly won't replace a thorough face-to-face interview, but we'll obviously take it into account," he said.
